# Our Itinerary:

#### Saturday, November 5:

Depart the city of your choice for Buenos Aires.

#### Sunday, November 6:

Arrive in Buenos Aires, where you will be met and driven to the Hotel Sofitel B. A. (www.sofitel.com). Free afternoon. Welcome reception. Dinner on your own.

#### Monday, November 7:

Breakfast in our hotel. Visit Juan Manuel Barreiro's property. After lunch, travel to the town of General Belgrano to visit Guillermo Gibelli's carriage museum. Late return to Buenos Aires.

#### Tuesday, November 8:

Breakfast in our hotel. Free morning to relax. After lunch, depart for the town of San Antonio de Areco.

#### Wednesday, November 9:

Breakfast in our hotel. Visit a private carriage collection in the town of Duggan.

#### Thursday, November 10:

Breakfast in our hotel. Travel to Juan Gibelli's estancia and enjoy a full day's visit.

#### Friday, November 11:

After breakfast, depart (with luggage) for Areco. Overnight at the Hotel Patio de Moreno (www.patiodemoreno.com)

#### Saturday, November 12:

Breakfast in our hotel. Enjoy the Gaucho Festival in San Antonio de Areco. Dinner.

#### Sunday, November 13:

Breakfast in our hotel. Enjoy the Gaucho Festival parade in San Antonio de Areco. Dinner.

#### Monday, November 14:

Breakfast in our hotel. Travel to the town of Escobar to visit Guillermo Gibelli's property. After lunch, travel to the town of Lujan. Overnight at the Hotel Real Lujan, in the center of town.

#### Tuesday, November 15:

Breakfast in our hotel. Travel to the town of Bragado to visit Ernesto Figueras' property. Overnight again in Lujan.

#### Wednesday, November 16:

Breakfast in our hotel. Visit the Lujan Carriage Collection. After lunch, return to Buenos Aires for a free afternoon. Farewell dinner.

#### Thursday, November 17:

Breakfast in our hotel, and a free day to explore Buenos Aires. Check out by 6 p.m. and transfer to the airport.

## Details on a couple of our visits:

On this truly unique and special trip, we will start in the exciting city of Buenos Aires (the "Paris of South America"). From there, you will travel by private motorcoach, throughout B.A. Province, to visit private estancias (ranches) and their extraordinary collections of carriages, harness, appointments, books and, of course, horses! You will meet wonderful Argentinean people and enjoy their cuisine and wines.

Whether you travel with a family member or friend, or join us on your own, you will be cared for and pampered from the moment you arrive at the Buenos Aires airport. Everything is included in this fascinating trip: hotels, guides, transportation, and all meals (except dinner the first two nights), so you can leave your cares at home.

#### The Sofitel Hotel in Buenos Aires

Sofitel Buenos Aires (www.sofitel.com) is located in the tranquil and charming Arroyo Street. Surrounded by quiet, tree-shaded sidewalks, the area is a haven of antique shops and art galleries, a true epicenter of culture. The hotel features a perfect blend of French *savoir faire* and Argentinean tradition, with exquisite decor and the delicate scent of flowers.

#### San Antonio de Areco

Nestled in lush farmlands, San Antonio de Areco is probably the prettiest town in the pampas, with a peaceful atmosphere and picturesque colonial streets. The town dates from the early eighteenth century and still preserves a great deal of the *criollo* and gaucho traditions, especially among its artisans, who produce very fine silverwork and saddlery. By day, men don the traditional *boina* (a kind of gaucho beret), while in the evenings, locals head to the peña, a party with folk music and dancing. Gauchos from all over the pampas show up for November's *Día de la Tradición* ("Day of Tradition," or Gaucho Festival), where you can see them and their horses in the town's cobbled streets, in all their finery.

San Antonio de Areco's compact center and quiet steets are very walkable. Around the Plaza Ruiz de Arellano, named in honor of the town's founder, are several historic buildings, including the parish church. The old bridge across the Río Areco (from 1857), follows the original cart road to northern Argentina. Once a toll crossing, it's now a pedestrian bridge leading to San Antonio de Areco's main attraction, the Gaucho Museum.

#### Gaucho Festival (Day of Tradition)


Argentina's quintessential gaucho town goes wild each November to celebrate its *Día de la Tradición* (Day of Tradition). The central character in all the action is the gaucho, and to really appreciate the meat, the dancing, the handkerchiefwaving, and the equestrian acrobats, you'll need to study up on a bit of the history of this rough, tough, "real man's man."

Sunday's parade features several hundred men, boys, and an occasional small girl from nearby fields and faraway regions, all dressed to the nines in their best Sunday gaucho gear and all expertly controlling beautifully groomed horses with ornate leather and silver bridles.

When you've clapped until you can clap no more, and you think it's all over and must be lunchtime soon, there come the *tropillas* of untamed horses, each group led by a single expert rider, and ornate chariots with ruddy-faced girls in huge skirts and lace-ribboned hair. It's an amazing sight for anyone, but particularly for anyone keen on all things equestrian, as according to the locals, these horses and their apparel are some of the finest that can be seen in the whole of Argentina.

Throw in a marching band dressed immaculately in white, some local children dancing *gato* in the corner, and a host of popcorn sellers trundling through the clapping crowds, and you'll wonder why this isn't called a carnival – the atmosphere of national pride and cheery circumstance is almost as palpable as the *asado* you're about to feast on.
